

Monday, March 6, 2023 (day 57 of the 120-day session)

This past week has been "floor action" as it is called at the legislature. The policy and fiscal committees have done their work for the first half and now bills are being deliberated for the final time in their "house of origin". A total of 2,021 bills have been introduced this legislative session.

The House of Representatives burned the midnight oil on Thursday staying on the floor until 1:30AM and passing 31 bills in total. During the March 2<sup>nd</sup> floor session twelve of the thirty-one bills cleared the House floor on unanimous votes. Half of the bills cleared the floor by 90% vote or greater. In a polarized political culture, it's important to point out that most of the work the legislature does is very bipartisan, and the two sides work together on much of our state policy.

Another illustration of this is the Senate calendar from Thursday. A total of 24 bills came across the Senate floor and of those, fifteen of them passed unanimously by a 49-0 vote. We often hear about the partisan divide among the legislature, and those are the topics that get the most ink and online headlines. But most of the work done is in a bipartisan nature.

March 8<sup>th</sup> marks the final day for House of Origin bill meaning it will be "floor action" until then. As of Friday morning March 3<sup>rd</sup>, the House has now passed a total of 194 bills. The Senate has completed work on fewer bills as they are a more deliberate body and spend more time on the floor voting on bills.

As we closer to the March 8<sup>th</sup> deadline there is more urgency in getting votes across the floor. This week the House didn't adjourn its work until 2:18am on Sunday morning.

#### **Bills of interest:**

#### **Plastics**

<u>HB 1131</u> is a solid waste bill around recycling requirements of PPP producers.

The bill requires producers of certain paper products and packaging (covered PPP) to participate in and fund the operations of a producer responsibility

organization (PRO) to collect and manage covered PPP from consumers and carry out other specified activities. Pesticide, herbicide, and other federally regulated packing materials are exempt as part of the compromise in this bill, but we are continuing to make our case for that and encouraging the legislature to keep that exemption in the bill should it pass. This bill has been pulled from the Rules committee and is awaiting a floor vote before the March 8<sup>th</sup> deadline.

HB 1240 - Establishing firearms-related safety measures to increase public safety
This bill prohibits the manufacture, importation, distribution, sale, or offer for sale of any assault weapon, subject to various exceptions for licensed firearm manufacturers and dealers, and for individuals who inherit an assault weapon. It also provides a violation of these restrictions constitutes a gross misdemeanor and is actionable under the Consumer Protection Act

#### **Transportation**

#### Mileage Tracking HB 1736

Requiring the department of licensing to collect vehicle odometer readings at the time of original vehicle registration and registration renewal. This bill was passed off the House floor on Saturday night by a vote of 53-43 and will now go to the Senate.

# <u>HB 1832 - Implementing a per mile charge on</u> vehicle usage of public roadways.

This bill failed to make it through the cut-off but could still be considered as part of the budget process.

#### **Education**

## HB 1658 -Authorizing public high school students to earn elective credit for paid work experience.

This bill Authorizes high school students aged 16 and over to earn up to two elective credits through paid work experience if specified requirements are met. It also provides that proposals for earning elective high school credit through paid work

experience may only be approved at high schools that provide students with the opportunity to learn and master the state financial education learning standards. The vote was 93-4 in favor of this policy.

HB 1013 - Establishing regional apprenticeship programs- This bill Directs OSPI and ESD's to establish the Regional Apprenticeship Preparation Pilot Program with five program sites located statewide. Three located west of the crest of the Cascade mountains; and two located east of the crest of the Cascade mountains. This passed the House Floor by a vote of 97-0. This is an apprenticeship program that can be used by current high school students in partner schools with the goal of growing the program state-wide.

#### **Local Agriculture**

A nice bill we are supporting this session is <u>SB</u> 5431. This legislation directs the Washington State Department of Agriculture to establish an advisory committee of food production organizations for a

voluntary location-based program to promote local food and agricultural products. This bill cleared the Senate 47-0 and will be considered in the House during the second half of the session. We continue to support and engage in this policy.

#### **Budget**

The final budget forecast will be presented by the WA State Economic and Revenue Forecast Council around March 20<sup>th</sup> of this year. This will be the final forecast before the House and Senate budgets are introduced and debated in committee. The previous forecast in the February 2023 showed an adjustment of \$88 million to the high side, or about a 1.1% increase in total receipts above expected revenue. The expectation remains that the biennium budget passed will be around \$70 billion.
