# **Online Legislative** Information Is **Readily Available**

Are you interested in knowing more about your legislators? Would you like to know which bills the sponsored and how they voted on certain topics? Would you like to know more about voting in Washington? information and more is readily available online.

The Washington Legislature website has a wealth of information and is easy to use, see http://leg.wa.gov/. You can find your legislative district, look up your legislators. Find contact information, committees, bill sponsored, bio and more for each legislator. You can also search for bills by topic and search state law.

For those of you interested in legislative statistics, there is a website named Washington Votes. org. It has a wealth of information and allows you to look up how your legislators voted and create your own scorecards on issues that are important to you.

As an example, for the 2018 session, the WashingtonVotes.org website shows the following:

- New bills introduced: 1,425
- Number of bills passed:
- Total roll call votes (bills and amendments): 1,041

That's a lot for a 60-day session. During the 2017 regular and special sessions, the legislature passed 377 bills in 193 days. Note that the number of bills passed does not reflect the quality of the work. The big different between the 2017 session and the 2018 session was split party control. In 2017, the Democratic party controlled the

House of Representatives while the Republican party controlled the Senate. In 2018, the Democratic party controlled both chambers. That makes it much easier to pass

Another website of interest is the Secretary of States Elections page, https://www.sos.wa.gov/ elections/. This shows all of the offices up for election this year. At the federal level, all members of Congress are up for election as well as US Senator Maria Cantwell. At the state level, all members of the House of Representatives are up for election as are half of the state Senators. Three Supreme Court Justices must run, along with numerous Court of Appeals Judges and Superior Court Judges. Another link will show you all of the offices up for election in each county. The site contains a link to the statewide online Voters Guide, allows you to update your voter registration, see which candidates have filed to run for election, read any citizens initiatives that have been filed and after the election, see results. The Research link allows you to delve deep into election law and statistics. For example, did you know that Washington currently has 4,235,390 registered voters? 7.4 million people live in the state, so only 57% are registered to vote.

Currently, the candidate filing page is blank. Candidates are only allowed to file for election between May 14-18 in 2018. The Washington state primary is August 7 this year. The general election is November 6.

Look for more information about candidates and voting as election day gets closer.

# **Hall Improvement Contest Entries Due May 15**

Entries in this year's Grange Hall Improvement Contest are due by May 15 to the Washington State Grange Office.

Each Subordinate Grange is encouraged to improve and beautify its hall and grounds. This contest is designed to promote Grange hall improvements by awarding cash prizes each year.

Granges should be proud of the achievements in improving their halls and the surrounding grounds. Each Grange should prepare an attractive and well-organized notebook illustrating the hall improvement projects completed in the past year.

The notebook should be prepared with the Grange name on the front cover. Include a written description, 500 words or less, of the hall improvement projects completed. Pictures, both before and after, should be included with small captions for each picture. Include any newspaper clippings about the project. Helpful facts to include in your notebook are: listing of major projects, source of funds for improvement projects, and details about the volunteers who helped (both members and nonmembers).

The prepared notebook is to be sent by May 15 to the Washington State Grange, PO Box 1186, Olympia WA 98541.

Four top entries will be selected in the contest. Each of the four winners will receive an interior wall plaque and cash awards of \$500 for first place, \$300 for second place, \$200 for third place, and \$100 for fourth place. Each Grange that enters the contest will receive a Grange hall town marker sign.



# **Resolution Writing Tips**

Resolutions are not hard to write!

One of the real benefits of membership in the Grange is the opportunity that membership gives to every Grange member to have an effective voice regarding the issues that affect their lives. Each of the National and Washington State Grange policy positions all started as resolutions that were written and adopted by a local Grange chapter.

Even so, some people are still intimidated at the idea of writing a Grange resolution.

As the State Grange is scheduled to hold its Annual Convention this June, we hope it will help generate greater interest in grass-roots participation in our Grange legislative program. The postmarked deadline for submission of resolutions from Subordinate and Pomona Granges is <u>May 28</u>.

Here is a quick and easy overview of writing a resolution:

**Title of Your Resolution Here** (This should be just a few words and easily summarize what the resolution is about)

Whereas, this is where you identify one problem that needs to be addressed or solved; and

Whereas, only place one reason or fact that supports your argument in each whereas para-graph; and Whereas, only put facts in the whereas paragraphs that make it easier for the reader to understand the purpose of your resolution; Therefore, be it

# This Earth Day, We Celebrate Major Impacts Through Soil Health

By C. Wayne Honeycutt, Ph.D.

U.S. farmers and ranchers are adopting soil health-promoting practices (e.g., no-till, cover crops, prescribed grazing) to increase soil organic matter (carbon), while also reducing soil and nutrient losses to our waterways and greenhouse gas emissions to our atmosphere.

However, it is clear that we simply cannot afford to be complacent, thinking that we have all the answers to soil health and environmental stewardship, because we do not. Doing so would ignore our responsibility to both current and future generations for providing plentiful and nutritious food, feed

for livestock, fiber for clothing and other uses, as well as resources for fuels, while also delivering clean water and clean air.

So today, I challenge us to imagine a time when we fully understand the chemical signaling – that dialogue – between plants and soil microbes. Imagine understanding how to manage those communications to naturally suppress plant diseases and build drought resilience.

Imagine a time when our understanding of the interactions among plants, soil microorganisms, and their environment (i.e, the phytobiome) is married with our understanding of the microbiome in humans, so that through a

fundamental knowledge of soil and plant processes, we deliver what humans need for optimal health and longevity.

Now imagine a time when all farmers and ranchers use soil health management systems that improve water quality, increase carbon sequestration, increase drought resilience, reduce greenhouse gas emissions, and provide wildlife and pollinator habitat, too. Imagine what we can celebrate, in just a few short years, on Earth Day 2025.

tulip variations. The group completed their stay in Tulip Town with a photo to remember the day.





#### **Double Chocolate Biscotti**

**Prep time:** 30 minutes **Cook time:** 25 minutes **Servings:** 40

3 cups all-purpose flour 1/2 cup cocoa powder

1 cup packed light brown sugar 1 1/2 teaspoons baking powder mon 2 eggs, plus 1 egg yolk

1/4 teaspoon ground cinnamon 1/4 teaspoon salt

1/3 cup milk

1 tablespoon balsamic vinegar

1 cup semisweet or bittersweet chocolate morsels

 $1/2~\mathrm{cup}$ Filippo Berio Extra Light Olive Oil, plus 1 tablespoon for coating pans

On sheet of waxed paper, combine flour, cocoa powder, baking powder, cinnamon and salt; set aside.

Using electric mixer, beat olive oil with sugar until smooth and light. Add eggs and egg yolk, one at a time, beating until smooth. Add milk and vinegar; beat until smooth. With mixer on low speed, gradually add flour mixture, beating until just combined. Stir in chocolate morsels with large spoon; cover with plastic wrap. Refrigerate at least 4 hours.

Heat oven to 325° F. Grease two large baking sheets with 1/2 tablespoon olive oil each. On lightly floured surface, divide dough into quarters. Roll each piece of dough into log, about 1 1/2 inches in diameter. Place logs on baking sheets, leaving space in between. Bake about 30 minutes, or until golden and set. Transfer to rack; let cool 10 minutes.

Reduce oven temperature to 300° F. On cutting board using serrated knife, cut each log into 3/4-inch-wide slices diagonally. Place slices, cut-side down, on baking sheets. Bake 15-18 minutes, or until toasted. Transfer to racks; let cool.

# Goldendale Grange Connection To House Bill 1539 – ERIN'S LAW

When Governor Jay Inslee recently affixed his signature to House Bill 1539, "Erin's Law," it was a major victory in Washington's battle against Childhood Sexual Abuse. House Bill 1539 requires all schools in Washington State to provide age-appropriate information and training related to the prevention of sexual abuse of children. Sexual Abuse in children is more common than people think, national statistics show that one in 4 girls and one in six boys will be sexually abused in some form before they turn 18.

What isn't widely known is the legislative work creating House Bill 1539, Washington's version of Erin's Law, got its start in Klickitat County. Olivia Holderman, a member of Goldendale Grange #49, had been sexually abused as a child. She didn't understand what was happening at that young age but she knew it was inappropriate. It took her almost six decades to be able to openly discuss and deal with the experience.

When Olivia discovered Erin's Law three years ago she immediately knew the time was right to pursue her mission. She contacted 14th District State Representative Gina McCabe, also from Goldendale, explained her early abuse and asked for McCabe's help, Representative McCabe listened intently and turned Holderman's pain into action by writing and sponsoring HB 1539 – Erin's Law.

Ultimately, in January of this year Olivia testified before the House Education Committee with support from a good friend, Grange member Fran Finn Songer. Erin Merryn, a 33-year mother, originator of Erin's Law and sexual abuse survivor, made the trip to Washington from Illinois to testify about her childhood sexual abuse. Their combined testimony captivated the attention of everyone in the room and moved the legislative process forward.

On Monday February 12, Representative McCabe's bill passed the House of Representatives without a single negative vote. In a surprisingly swift vote the

bill unanimously passed the State Senate. Finally, by Mid-March the bill promoting Washington's version of Erin's Law moved from the Capital Legislative Chambers to Governor Inslee's desk for his signature. He was onboard with the legislation and immediately signed the bill. With the Governor's signature, Washington State became the 32 State to establish Erin's Law.
