We made few changes and I thought I'd share the information for the Creative Writing contest so you can get started on your entries.

Creative Writing – Get Your Creative Juices Flowing

Poetry – The 2020 theme for the Poetry Contest is: "Camping". There is no word limit.

Short Story/Anecdote – The theme for 2020 is "Thoughts on Nature". This category has a maximum word limit of 1000 words. Remember, your short story/anecdote should entertain the reader.

Essay – The 2020 theme for the essay is "It's Native to Walla Walla". This category also has a 1000 word limit. Your essay should be informative for the reader. **Book Review** – This is a review of a book that you would recommend to others. Your entry should evaluate/critique the overall work – not re-tell the story of the book. The word count has been eliminated.

This contest is open to both members and non-members. The divisions are: Adults, age 20 and older and Youth, ages 14 – 19. There is no contest for kids younger than 14. How An Idea Develops Into A New Law

Last month, I wrote about what happens to resolutions after convention. This month let's take it a step farther and learn how an idea can develop into a new law.

Washington has 49 legislative districts, each elects a Senator and two Representatives so, each citizen is represented by three legislators. Senators serve four-year terms and Representatives serve two-year terms.

The Washington state legislature meets every year. In odd numbered years, following an election, the legislature meets for 105 days and crafts a new biennial budget. In even numbered years, the legislature meets for 60 days and adopts a supplemental budget. Either session can be extended with 30-day special sessions if needed. The regular session begins the second Monday in January each year. In 2020, that will be January 13.

Citizens have a voice. Any legislator may introduce a bill on any subject. If one or more constituents approach a legislator with an idea, that legislator may have a bill drafted and introduced on the subject.

Legislators can't help you if they don't know who you are or what you need. Washington state is becoming increasingly urban. Fewer and fewer legislators understand rural issues. If farmers, foresters and other citizens from rural area don't come to the capital to tell their story, it won't be heard. After the next census and redistricting, it is very likely that half of all legislators in Washington State will be from King County.

To be effective at influencing legislators, it's best to develop a relationship with them before the legislative session begins. Get to know all three of your legislators and their staff. A good way to do this is to attend events where they are speaking or invite them to speak at Grange meetings. Every legislator has and assistant who manages his or her calendar. Legislators are very busy and some Legislative Assistants (LA) are very protective of their time. The better relationship you have with the LA, the more likely you are to get an appointment. LAs can also be very helpful at guiding you to the best approach to communicate with a legislator. Sometimes, an email or phone call may work better than a meeting.

Do your homework. Every legislator's bio is online on the Washington State legislature's

website and on his or her campaign website. Search for them by name. Reading their bio will tell you about their family, work experiences and interests. Finding something you have in common is a great way to build a relationship.

It's also important to research your issue. Know who might oppose it and why. How much will it cost? Legislators do not like to be blindsided, so the more thorough your research, the more willing they will be to take up your issue. Prepare a one-page sheet about your issue to give to your legislators.

I will continue this series about influencing the legislature. As always, if you have nay questions or would like more information, please let me know.

Cultivating Connections in 2020

As the National Grange Master, Betsy Huber announced at the 153rd Annual Session last month, the National Grange's theme for 2020 is "Cultivating Connections". This theme builds upon the 2018 "I'm a Do-er" and 2019 "Hometown Heroes" themes.

Hosting events like a Trunk or Treat or an Easter egg hunt or a Santa's breakfast are great ways to get to know the youth in your community.

Finding your local connections in your community is a key factor to consider. Is your Grange connected with local organizations, local government, the military and veterans in your area? How can we better cultivate those connections? What does the Grange offer to them and how can we better partner with others in the community?

These are all great questions to ask as a Grange as you begin to work to set goals for the coming year.

National Grange John Trimble Legislative Award Winner Jonny Pittman Discusses His Experience

It was my pleasure to attend the 153rd National Grange Convention in Bloomington, Minnesota as the youth representative for the John Trimble Legislative Experience. The John Trimble Legislative Experience is a National Grange program that allows one to two Grange Youth, aged 16 to 35 to be a full voting member of a national committee, to be officially be seated with the National delegate body, and to be recognized during roll call of the delegates.

As a founding member of Moses Lake Grange #1151 in May of 2017, I knew little about Grange at any level. By November 2017, I became a 7th degree member at the National Convention in Spokane, WA.

The following 2018 Washington State Grange was the first state convention attended as a voting delegate. I knew nothing about Robert's Rule of Order or how the resolution process worked. Sitting on the committee we read the resolution, debated what we thought about the resolution, and then voted on what to do with the resolution. After the opening of the State Grange, we moved into the work with the delegate body. I remember sitting there wondering what in the world is going on? A resolution is read,

then an amendment is made to the amendment. Somebody else is confused and asks to question. But instead of answering their question the delegate body stops debating and immediately votes. Not knowing what was going on was a feeling I did not like. After state convention, I read Robert's Rules of Order, bought a double-sided cheat sheet to Robert's Rule of Order, and read another book that walked through different examples of how a meeting progresses using Robert's Rule of Order.

someone makes an amendment,

November 2018, I attended the National Convention in Stowe, Vermont as part of the National Youth Officers Team. I remember surviving Grange drill boot camp, learning an opening and closing drill in two nights, to be done during the youth opening for Friday's Session. During the opening, I first heard of the John Trimble Legislative Experience, as the winner of that year's experience, a youth from California, was included in the morning roll call of officers. After the 2018 National Convention I made it known to my local Grange and to the State Grange President that I would like to apply for the John Trimble Youth Legislative Experience.

After signing up as a delegate for the 2019 state convention, I was surprised to be assigned chair of the National Legislative Committee.

Leading the committee meeting, and answering the questions when the delegate body asked wwwhhhyyyy were all challenges that pushed me just outside of my comfort zone. I am grateful to have been surrounded with a team of committee members, each qualified to lead the committee, but kind enough to share their wisdom and experience when I was not 100% sure how to proceed.

The official photo backdrop of the 2019 National Grange Convention read "Everything has led you here". The above story explained how I made it to the 2019 National Grange Convention for the John Trimble Legislative Experience, when just a couple of years before I was ignorant in all things Grange.

At the 2019 National Convention I was placed on the Ag committee. I remember walking into the committee room to be warmly greeted by Grange leaders from Maryland, Nebraska, North Carolina, Pennsylvania, Massachusetts, Montana, Indiana, and Illinois. I observed how the committee worked through the resolutions and spoke up on topic I knew, or when computer-based research was needed. This year marked the second year the National Grange gave delegates the option to follow the resolution work using a computer and SharePoint. As the youngest person in the room, it was satisfying to show the delegates how to use SharePoint and watch them





learn, only needing to show them once. I later learned the delegate from Nebraska was given the job as committee secretary, so he would be too busy typing to have time to talk.

The National Session Opened in the 7th degree and I was seated next to my mentors from North Carolina, Jimmy and Anita Gentry. Jimmy and Anita showed me true southern hospitality. All session long when I had a question Jimmy and Anita would give straightforward, thought out answers. On the first day, Anita assured me I had the authority to ask to speak on the session floor and kindly encouraged me to speak up. Observing Jimmy for the week, I saw a leader that was always reading to learn, not speaking unless he had something worth saying, and when speaking he spoke with knowledge, authority, and enthusiasm. I could not have asked for a better pair of mentors.

For the most part, I now understand what is happening on the session floor, and can appreciate delegates that speak well on the floor. I realize how important committee work is. In the committee setting the resolutions can really be discussed, reviewed, and dug deeply into. By the time a resolution hits the session floor, things are moving quickly and there is no time to dig deeply into the meaning of the resolution. Furthermore, I am starting to understand what makes a good resolution. First a resolution needs a specific, unique title. Next a resolution needs enough whereas detail to explain the resolution, but the resolved needs to be direct and detailed enough to stand on its own. Yet it should not be so narrowly detailed in scope, written to support a specific bill going through the legislation. As bills progress through the legislature, bills can be changed from what the

Grange initially supported. Or if the bill dies, the meaning behind the resolution will need go through the resolution process all over again. But if the original resolution had covered the intent of the specific bill, the Grange would be able to lobby for it without needing to have it brought back through the resolution process. When a resolution says the Grange supports xyz, that is a very powerful statement, that allows our state Grange representatives and national legislative director to work with other like-minded groups to build coalitions to promote legislation the Grange stands for in our legislative handbooks.

The 2019 National Convention was not spent entirely in session. The best memories from convention came from reconnecting with Grangers met at past conventions and meeting new friends all over the United States. There was one nice old granny from Ohio that said I could call her grandma. I met a fellow chemist working to overcome the same professional struggles I face. I talked with the WWII quilt for valor recipient, and ordered a book he recommended that documented his time in occupied Japan dealing with the nuclear bomb fallout. The youth from Washington State represented our state well at Nationals, including but not limited to leading the opening drill, marching in step, speaking with confidence during the opening, passing on the National Young Patron title, and winning another National Youth Ambassadorship. Doing the John Trimble Legislative Experience and everything that led me to it has taught me skills that will be used in the Grange and in my professional life for the rest of my life. Thank you for supporting the Washington State Grange Youth.


