

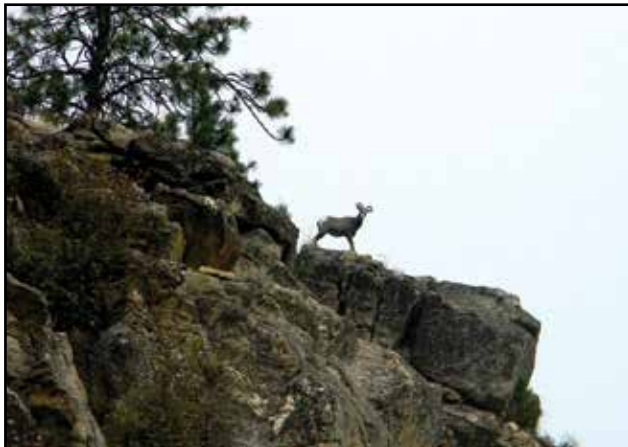

## Grangers Trek To Okanogan For Annual Convention

Grange members from across Washington State will be trekking to Okanogan for their state organization's 130th annual convention, June 26-29. The convention returns to the Okanogan for the first time since 2003.

The majority of those gathering

at the convention site – the Okanogan County Fairgrounds – are delegates elected to represent their local Granges. The bulk of their time will be spent in meetings, making decisions that will set the course for their organization for the coming year.

Besides delegates, there are scores

of volunteers who will have other responsibilities during the week, and many other members drive in to participate in special events, listen to guest speakers or simply to get together with old friends. It is anticipated that more than 500 people will either participate all week long or join in for at

least a day or two.

Officiating at the business meetings will be State Grange Master Tom Gwin of Humptulips Grange in Grays Harbor County.

Preparations for this year's event have been under the direction of a district convention steering committee

led by John Hamilton of Ferry County. He has been assisted by a host of volunteer sub-committee chairmen and committee members.

This year's session is being hosted by Granges in the Central

Legislative

A Difficult Session For Agriculture And Business

The legislature finished their work just before midnight on the last constitutional day of the session. This was an incredibly difficult session for agriculture and business. Numerous bills that would have been harmful for farmers and small businessowners were proposed. In the end, most did not make it through the process.

Several bills passed that may contribute to increasing the cost of both electricity and fuel including the Governor's 100% clean energy bill, E2SSB 5116. It requires utilities to phase out all use of coal by 2025 and requires all retail sales of electricity to Washington customers to be greenhouse gas neutral by 2030.

Some who buy or sell property will pay higher taxes after January 1, 2020. ESSB 5998 created a graduated real estate excise tax on real estate transactions over \$1.5 million. This new rate will not apply to agricultural or timber land including structures on agricultural land.

The State Department of Agriculture was directed to establish a program to protect pollinator habitat and the health of pollinator species by SB 5552. WSDA must establish a pollinator health task force including representatives from various state agencies, agriculture, conservation organizations, beekeepers, and more. The task force must develop a state pollinator health strategy.

There are always interesting items to be found in the budget. This year, the Department of Agriculture got new funding for the following programs:

- electronic tracking of cattle for animal health and disease traceability. This will allow cattle owners to register with the department and provide electronic reporting of cattle transactions.
- agricultural economic development in Southwest Washington including development of a food hub.
- a shellfish coordinator position to assist the industry with complying with regulatory requirements and identifying ways to streamline and make more transparent the permit process for establishing and maintaining shellfish operations.

• NE Washington Wolf-Livestock management funding is provided to maintain cost-sharing agreements with livestock producers to support non-lethal measures that can be used to minimize livestock loss from wolves and other carnivores. \$80,000 of the provided amounts is for grants to Ferry and Stevens county sheriff's office wolf support.

The Department of Fish and Wildlife got \$400,000 for elk management in the Skagit valley to work with tribes and landowners on elk fencing, replacement hay and other methods to mitigate the impacts of elk on agricultural crop production.

Washington State University got \$500,000 for new soil health research and extension activities to develop, evaluate and incentivize best management practices across agriculture. Part of the work will be done at the Mount Vernon Research Center.

The Office of the Superintendent of Public Instruction got \$150,000 to create a series of articles, videos, and educational curriculum on the history of agriculture in Washington state, including the role and impact of indigenous and immigrant farmers. The materials must be made available for free to schools, educators, and students.

A grant of \$1,750,000 goes to the state FFA Foundation to support agricultural science in schools. It will provide capital equipment grants for Washington State Ag educators who have completed their certification through the Curriculum for Agricultural Science Education (CASE).

The Capital budget also includes \$2 million for grants to improve health, safety and access at fairs. This goes to the Department of Agriculture to operate the grant program.

The following fairs will receive the following grants for construction projects:

- \$250,000 - NW Washington Fair (Lynden)
- \$103,000 - SW WA Fairgrounds (Chehalis)
- \$210,000 - Pacific Co. Fairgrounds Roof (Menlo)
- \$200,000 - Yakima Valley Fair & Rodeo Multi-Use Facility (Grandview)

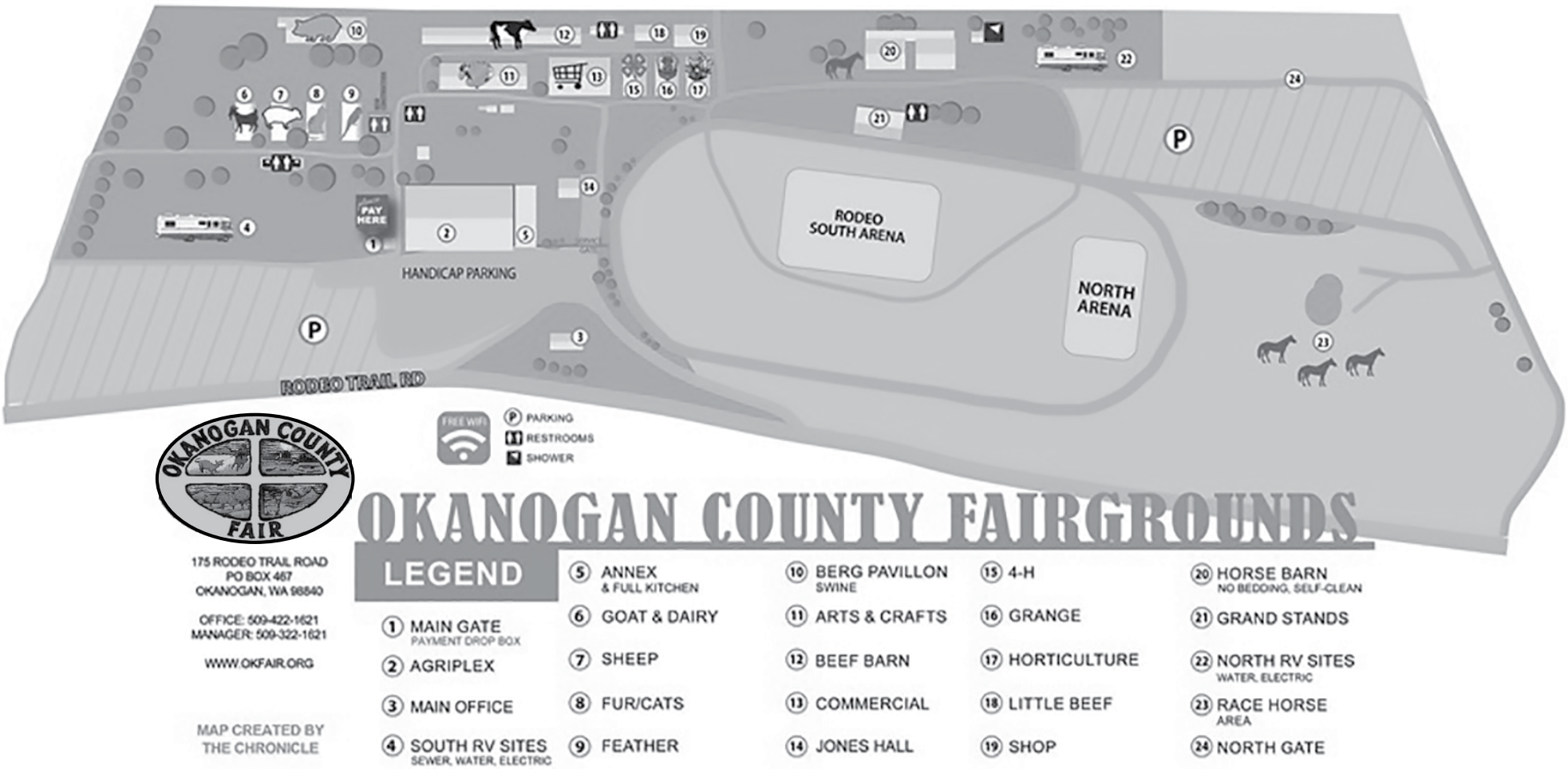

district that includes Chelan, Douglas, Ferry, Grant, Kittitas, Klickitat, Okanogan, and Yakima Counties.

Prior to the official opening session on Wednesday evening, June 26, several activities will occupy delegates and others. All committee members will report for work at 12 p.m. on that day. In those meetings, the Grangers will begin their task of closely examining all resolutions referred to the convention by local community Granges. Additionally, they will review standing committee reports and, in some instances, draft committee resolutions. All of those reports will be referred – with committee recommendations – to the delegate body for further debate and action later in the session. The resolutions cover a wide variety of topics from internal organization matters to policy issues that will occupy the organization's Olympia and Washington, DC, lobbyists in coming years.

Young people (teens and above) will begin their convention activities on Wednesday morning, electing and installing their own slate of officers.

At 7 p.m. on Wednesday,

members will assemble for the official opening of the convention. The opening will be followed by the reports of the Grange Cooperative Group and the presentation of the awards for the Grange Hall Improvement Contest. It will be followed by the annual memorial service that remembers all those who have passed on during the past year.

The work of the convention will begin in earnest at 8:30 a.m. Thursday morning when Gwin opens the session. Immediately after opening, he will deliver his report to the delegates. Following a short break, the delegates will begin their business session with reports from the various delegate committees. A full slate of state officers will be elected beginning on Thursday morning.

That evening, the Grange Celebration Banquet will be held. The banquet will include the presentation of several membership awards and the recognition of the 2019 State Grange Scholarship winners. The banquet will be followed with the Fund-Raising Auction that is utilized to support the activities of the various Grange departments.

Several special speakers will bring delegates up-to-date on current issues of concern. A complete list of speakers will be available just prior to the convention.

The business session will continue on Friday morning. The popular Junior Grange Ice Cream Social will begin at 12 noon on Friday, followed by Junior Grangers from across the state, who will take center stage as awards for their work will be presented on Friday afternoon.

The largest crowd of the week will be present at the annual Grange Talent Contest program on Friday evening at 8 p.m. The popular production, under the direction of State Lecturer Leslie Wells, is open to the public. There is no admission charge. The program will include performances from individuals and groups who passed through the District Talent Contest in April. The Youth Department will also hold their public speaking and sign-a-song contests. The winners of the two latter events advance to regional competition at the Western Regional Youth and Leaders Conference on August 9-11 in Elliston, Montana. The evening's top talent winner will perform at the 153rd annual National Grange Convention this November in Bloomington, Minnesota.

The Saturday morning schedule will be filled with a presentation by the Grange youth members. The young people will be recognized and awards presented for their Grange work over the past year. Following additional business sessions, the Grange will recognize eight military veterans at 11 a.m. on Saturday. Each veteran will be recognized with their own Quilt of Valor. The Grange and the QOV program will make the joint presentations. The Grange Leadership Award, the highest honor bestowed by the State Grange, will be presented at 11:30 a.m. on Saturday.



State Grange officers will perform the fraternal Grange's sixth degree, beginning at 2:00 p.m. on Saturday. This impressive ceremony includes the beautiful Rose drill that will be conducted by a team of Grangers from the host counties. Tickets for those members wishing to take the degree will be available at the convention in the registration area. Presiding Master for the degree will be Christine Hamp. The newly elected State Grange officers will be installed on Saturday afternoon, followed by the completion of business and the rapping of the gavel to close the convention.

There are many opportunities for fun and recreation at the convention. There is an ice cream social on Friday, baking contest and sale, special talent and presentations, youth tours and activities, banquets, workshops, conferences and, of course, the

impressive Grange displays. Most members attending the convention for the first time are amazed at the large quantity and wide variety of handiwork submitted by Grangers and others across Washington state. Tables will be filled with samples of needlework, quilts, sewing, craft creations, works of art and photography. These displays are open to the public beginning Thursday afternoon. The displays are under the supervision of the state lecturer and the directors of family living, youth, junior Grange, and community service activities.

State Master Gwin urges all Grangers to consider spending at least one day at their state session. Members who live in the area are encouraged to attend any of the events, especially presentations from visiting speakers. They may also bring along their prospective member friends to the open sessions.

## State invests \$6 million in rural broadband, clean energy infrastructure in six counties

*Washington State Community Economic Revitalization Board approves low-interest loans and grants to support community and economic development in Clallam, Kitsap, Mason, Whatcom and Yakima counties.*

The Washington Community Economic Revitalization Board (CERB) approved \$3.2 million in low-interest loans and \$2.67 in grants for public infrastructure projects targeting rural broadband, business growth and job creation for the Jamestown S’Klallam Tribe, Public Utility District No. 1 of Kitsap County, Mason County Public Utility District No. 3 and the ports of Bellingham and Sunnyside.

Four of the projects were awarded funding under the state’s first Rural Broadband program, established with \$4.6 million in the 2017-19 capital budget to increase access to education, business, telemedicine and other community and economic development opportunities that rely on high-speed broadband connectivity.

**Clallam County** – \$225,000 loan and \$225,000 grant to the Jamestown S’Klallam Tribe for the Jamestown Cell Tower Project, consisting of site prep, fiber build and construction of a carrier-ready tower that can support several 4G carriers and a wireless broadband ISP to provide services to residents, businesses, tribal government, administration and tribal businesses, as well as public

safety entities. An estimated 214 connections in the project area will have increased internet speed up to 25/5 Mbps, and increase the number of ISPs available to three. CERB funds are matched by \$150,000 in local resources.

**Kitsap County** – \$500,000 loan and \$500,000 grant to Public Utility District No. 1 of Kitsap County for engineering, permitting, construction and material procurement for the Last Mile Broadband Big Valley Project. When completed, provides an estimated 158 connections with increased internet speed up to 1G/1G, and increases the number of ISPs available to six. CERB funds are matched by \$420,000 in local resources.

**Mason County** – \$1 million loan and \$1 million grant to Mason County Public Utility District No. 3 for the Mason County Rural Broadband Fiber Expansion Phase 2 Project. This project includes construction of open-access, ready-to-connect fiber networks to six unserved rural communities in Mason County, allowing access for improved education, economic development, public safety, and telehealth services for Panther

Lake, Tiger Lake, Mission Lake, Dana Drive and Briscoe Point, Phillips Road, Totten Shores and surrounding areas. An estimated 675 connections in the project area will have internet speed up to 1G/1G, through six ISPs. CERB funds are matched by \$689,260 in local resources.

**Whatcom County** – \$584,391 loan and \$584,390 grant to the Port of Bellingham for the Whatcom County Rural Broadband Construction Project. This project consists of engineering and construction of a 40.6-mile open access dark fiber route, serving Cedarville and Cedarville East with an estimated 400 connections with increased internet speed up to 50/10 Mbps, and 351 connections with up to 100/20 Mbps. The area will have six ISPs available when the project is completed. CERB funds are matched by \$869,415 in local resources.

**Yakima County** – a \$975,000 loan and \$325,000 grant from the CERB program “Committed Private Partners” to the Port of Sunnyside will prepare for a multi-million-dollar construction project at Ostrom’s Mushroom Farms. CERB funding to the port supports

design, procurement and construction of a gas purification system, underground gas and electrical conveyance lines to Ostrom’s Mushroom Farms and a new genset unit with enclosure and waste heat recovery unit. Ostrom’s is investing \$45 million in the project, which is expected to create 156 jobs and retain 270 jobs within five years. CERB funds are matched by \$1.2 million in local resources.

“CERB projects represent an important partnership between the state and local communities resulting in enhanced economic vitality. The projects approved for funding represent the economic, cultural, and geographic diversity of our state. The board is pleased to collaborate with each of these communities to create permanent private sector jobs,” said CERB Chair Randy Hayden

“Broadband infrastructure is essential to improving connectivity throughout the state. These investments in rural broadband and the board’s support for private investment commitments, such as this one in Sunnyside, strengthen rural communities by enabling equal opportunities to take advantage of Washington’s overall robust

economic growth,” said Lisa Brown, director of the Washington State Department of Commerce.

The release of CERB funds to these projects are contingent upon each applicant completing specific pre-contract requirements, such as finalizing other funding sources and obtaining necessary permits.

Since 1982, CERB has committed nearly \$176 million to local jurisdictions across the state, an investment generating more than 35,500 jobs, and private capital investment of a \$5.7 billion (\$36 to \$1) return on CERB investment.

As Washington’s strategic economic development resource, CERB is focused on creating private sector jobs in partnership with local governments by financing infrastructure improvements. These improvements encourage new business development and expansion. In addition to funding construction projects, CERB provides limited funding for studies that evaluate high-priority economic development projects.

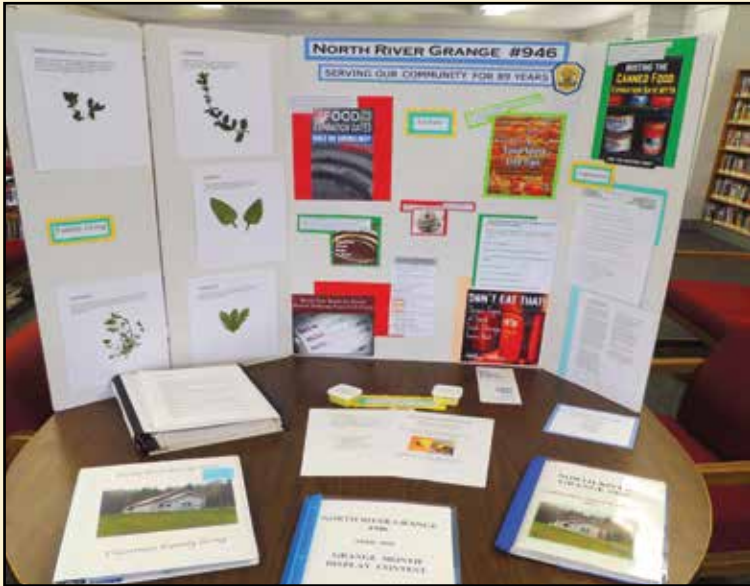

# Granges Improve Halls In Their Communities

For several years, the Grange Cooperative Group has recognized Granges for improvements to their Grange Halls with cash awards and award plaques. This year, six Granges have completed reports that include written descriptions of improvement projects, before and after pictures, and news clippings. A summary of this year's reports are:

**Five Mile Prairie Grange** (Spokane County) started their improvements with a complete makeover of their stage. After stripping it down to the studs, they added new wiring for recessed lights fixtures and additional outlets. Insulation was installed, followed by new sheet rock with taping, mudding, and texturing. Following the stage work, attention went to the back entryway. Again, the space was stripped down to bare studs, including the floor. The floor was leveled and new sub-floor was installed. They framed in a new broom and mop closet, along with framing a new ceiling. After sheet rocking and finishing, a new durable, rubberized flooring was wrapped six inches up the wall to double as a mop board. To finish the project, a new chair rack was purchased, helping to reorganize this space. The Grange was also benefitted by a local Eagle Scout project, who constructed a "Little Free Library" at the Grange hall. All work on these improvement projects was completed by Grange members and volunteers.



**Green Bluff Grange** (Spokane County) organized a beautification committee in 2013 with the purpose of five the Green Bluff Grange Hall a much-needed cosmetic makeover. With a small membership and limited funds available, most of the complete projects were minor repairs and painting. Moving ahead a few years, the beautification committee was asked to address some specific issues: electrical inadequacies and working space in the kitchen, attic insulation, roof repairs, and improving the landscaping and parking areas. The beautification committee made contact with the KXLY Extreme Team, who agreed to take on the remodeling of the Grange Hall. Completed projects included a new roof, new siding, removal of asbestos, electrical upgrades, and improved handicapped accessibility.



**Orcas Island Grange** (San Juan County) found several needs for improving their hall. The Grange joined with the Orcas Island Community Foundation for fund raising. The Grange identified three main projects: new doors, refinishing the floors, and extending the back porch. The fund-raising efforts proved fruitful. New doors were purchased and installed. The original Maple floor (nearly 100 years old) was sanded and refinished with a finish similar to a basketball court. The back deck, which is covered, was expanded and enclosed for storing the theatre seats when not in use. Use of the Grange hall has increased since the completion of the projects.



**Oroville Grange** (Okanogan County) starting fund raising in 2016 with the creation of a localized "Monopoly" game. The proceeds were used to repaint the kitchen. A new stainless-steel refrigerator was obtained. The kitchen improvements led to certification by the county for baking and canning at the Grange hall. Grange members continued their Improvements into 2018 with the replacement of the worn linoleum with an indoor-outdoor glue down carpet. The landings at the top and bottom of the ramp were covered with Plan vinyl laminate flooring. The laminate flooring also replaced the worn linoleum in the main foyer. In the restrooms, years of leaking fixtures led to rotted floors under the toilets, sinks, and urinals. The extensive decay was removed and covered with a mahogany underlayment and new linoleum sheet vinyl, creating a water-proof floor surface. The old toilets were replaced with handicap height toilets. The partitions in the restrooms were painted, along with the baseboards and trim.



**Riverside Valley Grange** (Pierce County) was approached by Murrey's Disposal Company in 2014 regarding the acquisition of the former Grange Hall. Grange members quickly met with Murrey's representatives on several occasions and worked out a property exchange where they would exchange their former hall and acreage for a new hall with smaller acreage. The State Grange approved the concept of the property exchange and work began. Their new hall is a few blocks away on a less congested street and better access to the roadway. The parking lot is paved and landscaped. Grange members salvaged what they could from the old hall and then began making purchases of item for the new hall.



**Selah Heights Grange** (Yakima County) experienced a failure of their septic system and drain field. To continue use of their hall, the Grange needed to install a new septic system. The project included surveying the Grange property, acquired necessary permits, tree removal, a new retaining wall, construction of a new system and drainage field, and the required inspections.



The top four place winners will be announced at the State Grange Convention following the Grange Cooperative Group Reports on Wednesday, June 26 at 7 p.m. All entrants will receive a Grange town hall markers, while the top four place winners will receive plaques and cash awards of \$500, \$300, \$200, and \$100.

Judging criteria includes evaluation of the projects completed in the past year, a subjective evaluation that rates the extent of the projects compared to the size of the community and Grange membership, the overall impact of the improvements on the appearance of the hall in its neighborhood and how those improvements boost the effectiveness of the local Grange.

Current members of the Grange Cooperative Group include the Grange Insurance Group, Great American Insurance Company, the Grange News, and the Washington State Grange.



# Washington State Grange Awards Over \$20,000 In Scholarships

The Washington State Grange is awarding \$21,750 in scholarships to deserving high school seniors and current college students. The scholarships are offered through the Washington State Grange Foundation to assist Grange members and children of Grange members in attending college. 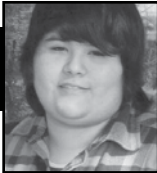
## WYATT PALMER

Lemon Bars

Recipe adapted from Better Homes and Gardens

- Nonstick cooking spray
- 2 cups, plus 3 tablespoons, all-purpose flour, divided
- 1/2 cup powdered sugar, plus additional, for topping
- 2 tablespoons cornstarch
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 3/4 cup butter
- 4 eggs, lightly beaten
- 1 1/2 cups granulated sugar
- 1 teaspoon lemon zest
- 3/4 cup lemon juice
- 1/4 cup light cream, half-and-half or milk

Heat oven to 350° F. Line 9-by-13-inch baking pan with foil; allow overhang. Grease foil with nonstick cooking spray; set aside.

In large bowl, whisk 2 cups flour, 1/2 cup powdered sugar, cornstarch and salt.

Using pastry blender, cut in butter until mixture resembles crumbs. Press mixture into bottom of baking pan. Bake 18-20 minutes.

**To make filling:** In medium bowl, whisk eggs, sugar, remaining flour, lemon zest, lemon juice and light cream. Pour filling over hot crust. Bake 15-20 minutes. Cool completely on wire rack.

Grasp foil overhang and lift from pan. Cut into bars. Sprinkle powdered sugar over bars before serving.

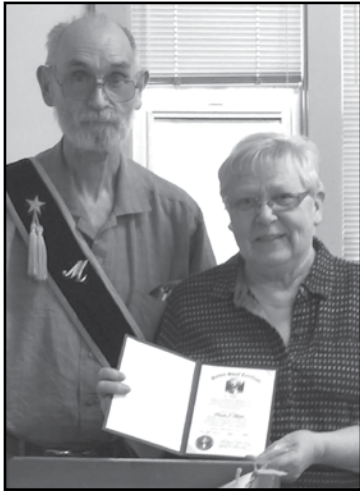
KLICKITAT COUNTY
