Legislative Update: It's All Over But The Budget, Mostly.

It's all over but the budget, mostly. The legislature has passed all cutoff dates. For the most part, bills are either passed or dead. But this process is full of exceptions, so some dead bills will come back to life and a few live bills will fail to make it past the Governor's desk.

The House and Senate have each passed three budgets operating, capital and transportation. There are many differences between the two sides, some are large, some are small. For example, the Senate Capital budget includes \$2 million for health and safety grants for fairgrounds. The House budget does not. The House Capital budget includes \$1.2 million for fencing to keep elk out of farm crops. The Senate budget does not. Before the legislative session can adjourn, both sides must agree on all three budgets. The last constitutional day of this legislative session is April 28. If the budget has not been finalized by then, a special session may be called.

New bills are still being introduced. Most of them are new taxes. One of the most recently introduced bills is SB 6017. It was sponsored by eight Democratic Senators, most of them fairly new to the legislature. The bill would impose an additional excise tax on any business that pays an employee more than one million dollars. If an employee makes more than \$10 million dollars, the tax rate would be 10%. According to the prime sponsor, Sen. Joe Nguyen, it is "a tax on wealth inequality." In the private sector, many highly paid employees get much of their compensation in stock options, so if the bill were to pass, the number of employees covered may be fewer than expected. Ironically, there are five public employees who make more than one million dollars per year. They are the University of Washington football coach who makes nearly \$5 million per year, the WSU football coach, the WSU basketball coach, the UW basketball coach, and the UW chief investment officer. Since the state does not tax itself, their salaries would not be included.

You may wonder why I'm writing about this since it is very unlikely that any Grange

members fall into this category. In both the House and Senate, there have been new bills introduced that are being referred to as Robin Hood bills. They take from the rich and give to the poor. This may sound appealing to some, but many farmers appear to be "rich" on paper because they own land. And imposing new taxes on highly paid employees has the potential to create unintended consequences. Some of the most innovative companies may choose not to come to Washington if we enact

Washington's economy has been booming for several years, especially in the Puget sound region. Eventually, there will be a downturn. State spending grew \$11 billion during the past four years. State lawmakers have taken advantage of the commensurate growth in tax revenues to invest in education and other important programs. But now the policy think tanks are getting anxious as the legislature continues to consider more spending rather than saving for a rainy day.

Hunter Orange: State law requires hunters to wear fluorescent orange clothing to ensure they are visible to others. ESSB 5148 passed the legislature unanimously. It would allow hunters to wear either fluorescent orange or fluorescent pink clothing.

Overweight Farm Trucks: SSB 5883 would allow vehicles carrying farm products to exceed total gross weight limits on occasion. Recognizing that it is difficult to weigh in the field, this bill would allow each driver to exceed total gross weight limits by two thousand pounds twice a year

Wolves: HB 2097 sponsored by Rep. Joel Kretz requires the Department of Fish and Wildlife to maintain sufficient staff resources in Ferry and Stevens counties for ongoing response to conflicts between gray wolves and livestock, and for continued implementation of proactive nonlethal deterrents. It also directs the department to develop and implement conflict mitigation guidelines for each wolf recovery region. Cattle producers, and conservation groups all supported the bill. The Center for Biological Diversity opposed

BEEvesting In Our Community

Several farms, nonprofit organizations and business partners collaborated recently to launch a Pollinator Pathway project in the Sammamish Valley in east King County. With an interest in ways to support the local food system these partners looked for a fun, family-friendly activity that would impact the local environment. Bees and pollinators were determined to be a sure-fire way to get started!

"BEEvesting in our Community," was originated by Sammamish Valley Grange #286, Sammamish Valley Alliance (SVA), 21 Acres and Coastal Community Bank. A Pollinator Pathway connects green spaces in a specific

corridor including backyard gardens, farms, planting strips, pea-patches, etc., along a designated pathway. These pathways host plants that bees and butterflies and other pollinators visit. It's a model used in both urban and rural settings to support the foundation of local food systems. Working cohesively, the above partners were looking for an opportunity to bring residents, farmers and businesses together encouraging everyone to further understandings of local environmental issues, food systems and climate challenges.

An easy first step was acknowledging and learning about the importance of bees in food production. The "BEEvesting" project, has short-term and long-term goals, beginning this spring as volunteers from the Sammamish Valley Grange and others installed mason bee boxes on several farms and properties in the Sammamish Valley. Why mason bees? Mason bees are native and provide important pollination services for trees, plants and vegetables. Although they don't produce honey, the fact that they're native means that they are well adapted to our environment and are key to many plants, including most of the foods that we eat, being able to survive. At the April Sammamish Valley Grange #286 program, members and guests heard from Olivia Shangrow, a biologist and operations specialist with the local company, Rent Mason Bees. She presented information on the importance of mason and leafcutter bees and other pollinators necessary for food production. Additional opportunities were also discussed to support the Grange's "BEEvestment" in the community.




WA State Grange Awards 24 Scholarships




