Legislative

Ag Industry In Full Swing ... And Looking Ahead...

I hope you have enjoyed our summer and the dry, warm weather that has come with it. Our state's agriculture industry is in full swing with countless combines out cutting wheat, cherry harvest is about in the books and apples are right around the corner. Because of the mighty Columbia River, Washington state is one of the top in the nation for crop diversity, commercially producing over 300 different crop varieties. Whether spuds, corn, mint, canola, beans or lavender this time of year is well suited for a drive through the Columbia Basin and beyond to see what our producers are cutting in this year's harvest.

ANNUAL SESSION

It was great to see so many of your smiling faces in Colville last month for our 135th annual session. I was afforded the opportunity to speak at the convention about sponsorship and legislative activities and I appreciated everybody's attention to the topics. The engagement was meaningful and productive as many of you shared success stories about how you have grown sponsorship relationships and have obtained long term sponsors since our meeting in April. Please feel free to reach out to me with questions about sponsorship for your Grange or to obtain a copy of that presentation.

COLUMBIA RIVER TREATY

The U.S. and Canadian governments have reached a preliminary agreement on a modernized Columbia River Treaty on July 11th. At the time of the announcement US President Joe Biden said the agreement will reduce the amount of power the U.S. sends to Canada, but also will afford the U.S. less storage capacity in Canadian reservoirs to protect downstream communities in Washington and Oregon from floods. The deal allows Canada more opportunities to import and export hydropower into the U.S. market, a crucial boost to both countries.

Washington State Senator Patty Murray added, "The United States and Canada reaching an agreement in principle to modernize the Columbia River Treaty regime after over six years of tough negotiations is an important step forward. I am hopeful the agreement successfully meets our objectives and works for ratepayers, Tribes, river users, our local ecosystems, and everyone on our side of the border.

CAPITAL BUDGET GRANTS

Tom and I met in July with Grange members to go over the process for securing funds from the department of commerce for our members who were awarded capital budget grants in 2024. The process of these grants being distributed will run until the close of the fiscal biennium on June 30, 2025. Please reach out to me if you need assistance navigating the department of commerce and the requirements to get your grant funds.

ELECTION SEASON

Thanks to the good work of past and present Grangers, we are currently in the midst of the top-two primary process that our state takes part in. On August 6th our state's primary race will come to an end and we will have a top two race for all of the competitive Senate, House and statewide races. When the dust clears in the days after the primary, the makeup of the legislature will begin to take form and we will have a good idea of what our 2025-2027 version of the Washington State Legislature will look like. Be sure to get your ballots in ahead of time for these elections.

Convention Recap

Delegates Debate And Take Action On A Wide Range Of Subjects

The delegates to the Annual State Grange Session debated numerous subjects. Highlights of these actions are as follows:

AGRICULTURE

- ➤ We support legislation that would give consumers the option of whether to buy cage free chicken eggs or caged chicken eggs.
- ➤ We oppose attempts to reclassify the potato from a vegetable to any other food designated group in the dietary Guidelines for Americans.
- ➤ We believe that only products naturally produced from animals may be labeled as meat or meat products.
 - ➤ We urge the establishment

of tariffs and a tariff rate quota system for the U.S. sheep industry.

➤ We support food sovereignty and self-sufficiency for local control of communities to produce, process, sell, purchase, and consume locally produced foods.

CONSERVATION & ECOLOGY

- ➤ We oppose any legislative action banning the use of internal combustion engines under 25 horsepower.
- ➤ We oppose legislation that creased additional wilderness, State and National Parks, National Monuments, or other natural preserve designated areas in Washington State

without proper purchase form and/or approval of the willing property owner.

▶ We recommend support for Initiative 2117, Prohibit Carbon Tax Credit Treading and Repeal Carbon Cap-and-Invest Program Measure (2024) as the original legislation (Climate Commitment Act of 2021) does not meet criteria as approved by the Washington State Grange and listed in the 2024 Grange Legislative Policy Handbook.

EDUCATION

➤ We recommend the Washington State Grange investigate and pursue the process of establishing the Grange as a Career and Technical Student Organization (CTSO) in the State of Washington.

FISH & WILDLIFE

- ➤ We oppose the importation of predatory species into the State of Washington. We further oppose the establishment of wildlife corridors to protect these predators.
- ➤ We support efforts to eradicate non-native harmful invasive species that threaten the native fish and wildlife of the State of Washington.
- ▶ We support federal legislation to tag and remove all seals and sea lions from the Columbia River, its tributaries, and the Puget Sound Basin to stop the destruction of the Washington State salmon runs. We further believe that any returning tagged seals and sea lions be removed a second time and if they return a third time they must be destroyed.

HEALTH, HEALTH CARE & SAFETY

- ➤ We go on record in support of Initiative No. 2124, opting out of State-Run Long Term Care Coverage Act, as current Washington State Grange policy supports the repeal of the Washington Cares Program.
- ➤ We support legislation to provide available facilities with

mental health support to all veterans returning from military life to civilian life if the veteran chooses to avail themselves of the opportunity.

- ➤ We urge the Washington State Department of Health to investigate and approve Faith Based Programs as an alternative to State licensed chemical dependency programs.
- ➤ We support legislation requiring all gluten-containing grains used to produce the ingredients of a food product to be declared in the ingredient list of the product. We further support adding gluten to the GSA list of major food allergens.

NATIONAL LEGISLATIVE

- ➤ We recommend a special committee be established to review and propose updates for the Telephone Service section of the State Grange Legislative Handbook.
- ➤ We support the American Beef Labeling Act (S 52) and encourage Congress to quickly pass this legislation.
- ➤ We support legislation to require all continuing online transactions to be opt in. We support increased transparency by requiring the opt out process to be as easy to access as the original opt in process.

STATE LEGISLATIVE

- ➤ We urge the state legislature and state government agencies to periodically review state laws and repeal those declared obsolete.
- ➤ We encourage the state legislature to abolish swipe fees for using credit cards for the payment of restaurant meals, fast food, and home delivery of food items.
- ▶ We oppose legislation that takes zoning regulation and residential density making power away from cities and counties.

TAXATION & FISCAL POLICY

➤ The State Granges goes on

record in support of Initiative N. 2109, Repeals the Capital Gains Tax, as current Washington State Grange policy supports the repeal of the state capital gains tax.

➤ We request the Washington State Legislature and Washington State Department of Revenue increase the property tax exemption in RCW 81.36.605 (Section 8) and RCW 64.36.037 regarding conditions for obtaining a property tax exemption for public assembly halls or meeting places of nonprofit organizations from fifteen (15) days to thirty (30) days.

TRANSPORTATION

- ➤ We support legislation to repeal the 2030 Electric Vehicle mandate in the State of Washington.
- ▶ We support any action to implement higher-speed train service (trains that can travel up to 110 mph) that would traverse the State of Washington from Portland. OR to Vancouver, BC, We further believe that should higher-speed rail be created between Portland and Seattle, action should be taken to ensure a stop in Vancouver, WA be included. We further believe the State of Washington should actively pursue federal funding to create an efficient higherspeed rail service through the
- ▶ We support modification of RCW 46.16.080 (2) where the Exemption for E-bikes (Electric-assisted bicycles) applies only to a type 1 E-bike (a pedal assist bicycle that only assist when the bicycle is being pedaled and cannot go over 20 mph) when traveling on public roadways or bike lanes. We further believe type 2 and 3 E-bikes are treated the same as a Moped under classification RCW 46.04.304 requiring license and insurance.
- ➤ We oppose legislation which creates or supports rolling resistance regulation legislation. We further oppose legislation which creates regulations on tires for any purpose other than public safety.

The delegates requested the National Grange to reject their resolution on collecting Junior Grange dues at the national level until such time as a full discussion on the issues surrounding how Junior Grange dues affects Family Memberships can be held and satisfactorily addressed.

GRANGE ACTIVITIES:

The delegates decided the proceedings of the Annual State Grange Session will be made available to Grange in a secure pdf format on the Washington State Grange website.



State Capital Budget Grants for Granges – Chimacum Grange Experience

The roofing on the Chimacum Grange #681 roof had "outlived it's useful life", with shingles blowing off frequently. It was getting harder to find someone to gear up and replace a few shingles on the steep roof. We were alerted by the State Grange about possible funding from the State through the "Member Requested Local & Community Project" funding in the Capital Budget. This process allows legislators to propose projects for funding that benefit the community. So we applied for funds to replace the roofing and were awarded

enough to get it done, thanks to sponsorship by Senator Kevin Van de Wege.

How does funding repairs to a Grange Hall roof benefit the larger community one might ask? As with most Grange's when the Hall isn't in use for Grange activities Chimacum makes the Hall available to the community for party's, weddings, memorial services, dances, pre-schools, educational activities and much more. The community loves our 92 year old hall!

The grant application process

was pretty straight forward. It's important to contact your legislators early in the process as one or more of them have to sponsor the project. Each legislator chooses which applications to submit, and then they all deliberate on which ones will be funded. If you're lucky yours will be funded.

That's the easy part. Once you've been awarded funding you start working with the Dept of Commerce which distributes the funds. NOTE: this is a reimbursement type grant –

you have to completely pay for the project and then will be reimbursed by the state. There's no such thing as "free money"! They require a lot of information before developing the contract. To get an idea of what's involved check out the "CCF Resource Toolkit" https://www.commerce. wa.gov/building-infrastructure/ capital-facilities/resource-toolkit/

Since it's state funding there are requirements to consult (send letters) with Tribes, the Dept of Archeology and Historic Preservation, pay prevailing

wages, etc. You have to prove you own the grange hall – do you know where your deed is? But it's just a bunch of paperwork and though a bit time consuming it's easy to get through – and the Dept of Commerce staff are really helpful and good to work with. It's a great opportunity to fund structural projects and address health/safety concerns at your Grange.

Each grange was sent a letter about the grant process with the application, which has to be submitted to the State Grange office by Sept 1. Good luck!

A View From The Hill - Summer 2024 Wrap-Up

AGRICULTURE AND FOOD

Federal Milk Marketing overhaul proposed by USDA

USDA is proposing to drop the way fluid milk is priced under the federal milk marketing orders established by the 2018 Farm Bill. The proposal would restore a rule that makes the Class1 milk (fluid milk) price the higher of the price of Class 3 (milk sold for cheese) and class 4 (milk sold for butter and powder) for the month, plus a differential that would vary by location. Extended shelf-life milk would also get a new pricing formula. The proposals are the result of an extended USDA hearing process that took place last year following an appeal by the National Milk Producers Federation to restore the old formula. The proposed changes must be approved by a dairy producer referendum.

USDA funds meat processing expansion

USDA is making \$110 million available to expand local meat processing capacity through grants for projects in 30 states. The Meat and Poultry Processing Expansion Program will distribute \$83 million, and the Local Meat Capacity Grant Program will distribute \$26.9 million. Funds will be used for building or expanding processing facilities, installing new equipment, meeting packaging and labeling requirements, and meeting staffing goals. Increasing local meat and poultry processing capacity is a top priority for the National Grange.

CONSERVATION AND ENVIRONMENT

Iowa approves controversial carbon pipeline

The Iowa Utilities Board has approved Summit Solutions' main liquid carbon dioxide pipeline through the state. The board ruled that the proposed service "is in the public convenience and necessity" and vested the company with the right of eminent domain across all requested parcels. However, Summit cannot start construction until it gets approval for a sequestration site in North Dakota and approval of pipeline routes in that state and South Dakota. Summit will be required to maintain an insurance policy to ensure landowners and tenants are compensated for damages that may result.

HEALTH CARE

Multi-cancer screening test passed by key committee

The Nancy Gardner Sewell Medicare Multi-Cancer Early Detection Screening Coverage Act (H.R. 2407) has been approved with strong bipartisan support by the House Ways and Means Committee. The Act authorizes Medicare to cover a simple blood draw screening test that detects a multitude of cancers with a single procedure. The National Grange shared the results of its rural cancer disparities study with committee members, which found that compared to urban areas, rural communities have overall higher rates of cancer incidence, late-stage diagnoses, and mortality. National Grange also sent 108 letters of support to committee members, their staff and committee staff. Ways and Means Chairman Jason Smith (R-MO) gave the National Grange a shout-out for their support in his press release following the bill's passage.

Support for Share the Savings with Seniors Act

The National Grange joined key patient groups on letters of support to the Hill for the bipartisan, bicameral Share the Savings with Seniors Act. The Act would require savings from rebates on medicines for chronic conditions to be passed along to Medicare beneficiaries at the pharmacy counter. Medicare beneficiaries are often charged coinsurance based on the list price of a medicine rather than a percentage of the discounted

net price the insurance plan pays. The Act remedies this disconnect by requiring the cost-sharing for chronic care medicines be based on the net price of the drug. Rebates for patients at the pharmacy counter has been a long-term priority for the National Grange.

Nearly half of U.S. counties lack a single cardiologist

Most counties without a cardiologist are rural, with lower income levels, less access to healthy food, and fewer health care providers overall. Millions of Americans likely to develop and die from heart disease live in cardiology deserts, according to new research by the American College of Cardiology. People living in these counties have a much higher prevalence of the entire spectrum of cardiovascular risk factors, including obesity, diabetes, smoking, high blood pressure, and high cholesterol. Although heart disease is the nation's No.1 killer, people living in

rural areas are dying earlier and more often from heart disease that could have been prevented, according to a recent report from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention.

What's all the hype about the Chevron Doctrine?

In June, the Supreme Court overturned the so-called Chevron deference that required courts to defer to federal agencies' interpretation of ambiguous laws. On a vote of 6-3, the court said the 1984 Chevron decision "defies the command of the Administrative Procedure Act that the reviewing court - not the agency whose action it reviews - is to decide all relevant questions of law and interpret statutory provisions." The decision is considered a huge win for the dozens of industry groups that supported the challenge by fishing companies to a National Marine Fisheries Service



rule requiring fishermen to pay for the cost of observers on board their vessels. The deference rule permitted federal agencies, rather than the courts, to determine the meaning of ambiguous federal statutes. Farmers, ranchers, forest owners, and landowners have long opposed the Chevron deference, and they most recently cited the Waters of the United States rule as a prime example of federal regulatory overreach. The Supreme Court decision will likely force Congress to give agencies more specific direction in the laws it passes.
