

Monday, March 17, 2025 (day 64 of the 120-day Session)

Lawmakers are entering week ten of work in Olympia, with Monday marking day 64 of the session. As we have discussed in a past version of the legislative report, March 12th was a significant cutoff date for the session, as it was the deadline for House bills to be passed to the Senate and Senate bills to be passed to the House; and any bills not passed by that date are now effectively dead for the rest of the session.

Legislators have now shifted focus back to committee work and public hearings on bills from the other chamber. Committee schedules are less busy than before the opposite house cutoff. Many bills were not passed by the House of Origin cutoff. Let's look at the numbers:

- ➤ 1800+ total bills to begin with
- ➤ 262 House bills remaining
- ➤ 273 Senate bills remaining

The next major cutoff, the Policy Committee Cutoff for the Opposite House, occurs on April 2nd. This marks the second half policy committee cutoff and final day for committees to read in reports from the other chamber, except for House fiscal committees and Senate Ways & Means and Transportation committees.

Our next Revenue Forecast from the state Economic and Revenue Forecast Council is set to be released on Tuesday, March 18. This update will play a key role as budget writers in both chambers rely on it to determine the available revenue for the upcoming two years. The House and Senate are expected to drop their budget proposals by March 24th. By then, the public will have a better understanding of the new revenue, tax increases, and the spending plans each chamber will propose to balance their two-year budgets. Another reminder from the last legislative update is that bills deemed necessary to implement the budget (NTIB) can still be considered, so there are "dead" bills that can still be considered.

Bill Highlight

House Bill 1141 – Agriculture Cannabis Workers

This bill passed the House March 11 with a vote of 55-40 and aims to extend collective bargaining rights to agricultural workers in the cannabis industry. Introduced by Rep. Ortiz-Self (D) and Rep. Fossee (D) the bill addresses a gap in labor protections for workers involved in cultivating, harvesting, and processing cannabis. Although cannabis workers in Washington have been allowed to unionize, they were previously excluded from the collective bargaining protections afforded to many other industries.

The legislation places Ag Cannabis workers under the jurisdiction of the Public Employment Relations Commission (PERC), enabling them to negotiate—rights they lacked under prior law. It applies specifically to employees on licensed cannabis farms performing tasks like growing, harvesting, drying, and trimming, while excluding managers and supervisors with decision-making authority. The bill also prohibits employers from interfering with unionization efforts or retaliating against workers for organizing, and it establishes binding arbitration as a mechanism to resolve labor disputes.

Supporters argue that the bill recognizes cannabis cultivation as an agricultural activity, deserving of the same labor rights as other farming sectors like wheat or apple production.

Opponents contend that the bill could harm an industry already struggling to compete with the black market. They also express concern that it might set a precedent for broader unionization across all agricultural sectors, a move they fear could disrupt traditional farming operations. The vote largely split along party lines, with one Democrat joining Republicans in opposition.

Senate Bill 5726 - Transportation Revenue

Senate Bill 5726 is aimed at addressing the state's transportation funding challenges by establishing a new revenue source based on motor vehicle use of public roadways. Sponsored by Senator Ramos (D-Issaquah), the bill seeks to replace the state's declining gas tax revenue with a road usage charge (RUC) system, reflecting the shift toward more fuel-efficient and electric vehicles (EVs) that reduce traditional gas tax income.

At this point I see this bill as dead but have left it on our tracking list as a potential NTIB bill and something that will be brought up again in the 2026 session. The core of SB 5726 is a proposed RUC of 2.6 cents per mile for vehicles weighing 10,000 pounds or less, excluding larger commercial trucks. The program would initially be voluntary but transition to mandatory based on vehicle fuel efficiency, with exemptions for certain vehicles like those publicly owned. Again, at this point we don't see this being part of the operating budget for this year.
